


Realistic Fiction book

- Characters- Sylvia was the main character, but her family (Mendez) was all included in the fight for equality in the school system.
- Plot- The plot of the story is when Sylvia and her two brothers were not accepted by
 everyone, including the staff in a school based on the color of their skin. They
 needed to go to the "Mexican school". Their father fought for his children to go to
 that school and gave reasons why. Some of the reasons were due to it being closer,
 teachers at the "Mexican school" did not care about the student's education and
 there being no reason why they should not be able to attend. The school system was
 clouded by bias.
- Setting- The story takes place in Orange County but begins in Westminster in California.
- Problem- The problem in the story is that a family was turned away from a school for the sole reason of their skin color.
- Solutions- Sylvia's father started a petition and hired a lawyer to fight the discrimination, and the school board lost the case on the County and State Court levels.

Possible Discussion Questions:

- What can we do as educators to embrace diversity in the classroom?
- How can we integrate diversity into our everyday lessons and our curriculum?
- What are the best ways to fight bias in school settings?

- Were there issues with racism in your school? If so, how were they dealt with?
- How can students themselves contribute to creating a more inclusive and anti-racist classroom environment?

- Mathematical Literacy Elements
 - Authentic Real-life Contexts roofs, sail boats, instrument in a symphony, bridges, slice
 of pie, putting your hand on hip
 - Integrated Content talks about adding a side and angle to make a quadrilateral, then pentagon,

- Connecting to student feelings The triangle kept wanting more and was never satisfied. ("Again, and again... the shape became dissatisfied")
- Elementary Content showing what makes a triangle a triangle and not a quadrilateral
 (3 side and 3 angles)
- o Personification attribution of human qualities (shapes talking, having feelings, etc.)
- Repetition Intentionally using a word or phrase for effect ("I'm tired of doing the same old things. There must be more to life.")
